Report of the

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February, 1920

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen of North Kenne-

bunkport:

In spite of the shortage of teachers, North Kennebunkport has been fortunate in having experienced teachers for its schools. State Superintendent Thomas tells us that fifty schools of Maine are without teachers and he expects 500 will be closed by next September. It is hoped more students will follow their High School course by fitting themselves for teaching by taking a course at Normal School. The financial inducements recently have not been attractive enough to furnish the Normal Schools

with students. It has been found necessary this year, in order to hold teachers, to increase their pay.

Text Books

The text book situation in the town was in rather an unsettled state. I am gradually arranging a plan of text books in the town so that there will be greater uniformity. Ail the .schools are now using the same series of spellers and the same arithmetic. Some changes are yet needed in text books in order to make the usage in all three schools uniform. Changes are being made gradually so as not to bring the total expense in one year. The Beacon system of teaching reading has been introduced and found valuable. A small increase in text book appropriation should be made, it seems to me.

Repairs

Repairs have been made on the Durell school. The light is now admitted entirely from one side; a jacket has been provided for the stove; one thing remains to be done, and that is to arrange for chimney ventilation.

The North Chapel school should be provided with better blackboards. The hyloplate boards put in last year at the Durell school are found very satisfactory. In order to keep the Burnham schoolhouse for future use, suitable repairs should be made. The outhouse at this school should be repaired this year. I recommend the installation of chemical closets at this school. To make proper repairs at the Burnham school and the others, I recommend an appropriation of at least \$500.

WARRANT

FOR TOWN MEETING, 1920. STATE OF MAINE.

County of York, ss.

To Herbert W. Huff, Constable of the Town of North

Kennebunkport, in said County: GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of North Kennebunkport qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Town house, in said town. on the 1st day of March, 1920, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following Articles, to wit:

Article One—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting .

Article Two—To see if the town will vote to dispense with the check list at this meeting.

Article Three—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article Four—To see how much the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of common schools.

Article Five—To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for High School Tuition.

Article Six—To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for repairs and insurance on school buildings.

Article Seven—To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for free text books.

Article Eight—To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for salary of Superintendent of Schools.

Article Nine—To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for school supplies.

Article Ten—To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges, and see what sum of money shall be paid to the road commissioners per day for their services, and fix the price per hour for labor on highways.

Article Eleven— To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of the poor.

Article Twelve— To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the payment of snow bills.

Article Thirteen—To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the contingent expenses.

Article Fourteen—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to borrow money when so directed by the Selectmen.

Article Fifteen—To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
